Foreword

The Hunt Institute presents the works of an ongoing career in botanical illustration. Mary Grierson, recently retired as staff artist at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, goes on doing the work she enjoys, freelance on special commission. Her life work exemplifies that happiest of arrangements whereby a hobby becomes a profession, and "retirement" is devoted to continuing the work that she has done since childhood.

This exhibition is organized into various categories representing types of projects carried out during the course of a busy career. Mary Grierson's work ranges from anatomical drawings for plant monographs to portrayals of plants in habitat groups issued as art color prints or calendar illustrations. If her career has been occupied with all phases of botanical illustration, it also embodies a particular direction: preservation of the earth's natural heritage. Indeed, plant preservation may be taken as the basic theme of her life work. Nearly everybody is aware that the Passenger Pigeon is irretrievably lost, and that the leopard is endangered; but many plants have also disappeared or are in a precarious condition. Miss Grierson has devoted her talent increasingly to the struggle to bring a wider public awareness to the cause of plant conservation.

Mary Grierson is a representative Briton: a grandmother was Scottish; she herself was born and schooled in Wales; she has worked in England and overseas. She credits childhood rambles over the mountains of Snowdonia in Wales for an early love of wild plants, and her grandmother's garden for familiarity with cultivated flowers. She has been drawing plants for as long as she can remember. It seems that nothing in her schooling and early work experience has been irrelevant to an ultimate career in botanical art. Her first job involved decoration

and flower arrangement for a quality confectioner. After World War II service as an aerial photography interpreter, she joined a cartographical firm and profited from the disciplined precision of making maps from aerial photographs. Meanwhile, she did free-lance plant illustration, and studied under the well known painter and illustrator John Nash. In 1960, she was appointed staff artist at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and put her hobby onto a professional level in the service of that most professional and prestigious of institutions. Its collection of living plant specimens is perhaps the most famous in the world. Seeds, roots, bulbs and other propagules are received from all parts of the globe, are grown and studied by botanists, and recorded by staff artists. Accuracy is essential and the work is demanding. Ink drawings are usually done from dried herbarium specimens, but color work is nearly always from living plants. These were either brought to her work desk or, if the plant's size made this impossible, Miss Grierson would perch on a ladder in a greenhouse or on the grounds, to the astonishment and admiration of the public. Retirement from Kew occurred in 1972, but there was no slackening, rather, a broadening in the scope of her work. Though some of the conservation calendar illustrations were produced independently during the period at Kew, this type of work expanded as she accepted invitations to travel and record endangered plants in the service of conservation organizations (Cat. Nos. 76-112).

Book illustration projects have included approximately one hundred figures published in volumes of the famous *Curtis's Botanical Magazine* (founded in 1787, and still going strong), and handsome paintings for a sumptuous folio monograph of the orchid family (Cat. Nos. 39-53). The Hunt Institute is proud to present this exhibition of works representing a distinguished career.

This exhibition has been made possible through the generous cooperation of the artist, who lent examples of her work and assembled most of the works loaned by the institutions cited in the catalogue listing. She also furnished information about herself and her work. General Abraham Yoffe arranged for the loan of paintings by the Israeli Nature Reserves Authority. The Hunt Institute is grateful for the efforts of Miss Grierson and of General Yoffe, and for the generosity of the following institutions which have lent artworks: the Ironbridge Gorge Museum Trust; Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew; the Bourton Press; the Frans Hals Museum; the Blandford Press; the Society for the Promotion of Nature Reserves; the National Trust; the World Wild Life Fund; and the Israeli Nature Reserves Authority.





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Mary Grierson was invited to illustrate tulip species collected from Asia, Asia Minor and the Middle East by Messrs. J. M. C. Hoog and T. Hoog, Dutch bulb growers, who plan to publish a book on the background and history of the tulip. As demands and pressures on land and other natural resources increase, so does the need for nature reserves to protect vanishing habitats, and to act as reservoirs for wild life. The Conservation Trusts and the Society for the Promotion of Nature Reserves now manage more than 800 nature reserves throughout Great Britain. Both organizations depend on voluntary support to protect and maintain miles of unspoiled coastlines, lakes, forests, moorlands, and islands—all of which are open to the public at all times, subject only to the needs of farming, forestry, and wild life protection. Israel (excluding Sinai), though scarcely larger than Wales, includes the extreme point of distribution of many plant species; it contains up to 2,250 species, compared to about 1,700 in the whole of the British Isles. The Israeli Nature Reserves Authority protects this rich flora in its many nature reserves, where visitors may not pick flowers without permission. Miss Grierson spent the spring season of 1970 in Israel, and of 1971 in Sinai, continuing a project begun earlier of illustrating protected plants.
