AWARDS

*TRI-COLOR—May be awarded to an exhibit which consists of all fresh cut plant material and which achieves a point score of 95 or more. "Distinction" (personal expression) is one of the qualities to be judged.

+CREATIVITY—May be awarded to an exhibit which consists of some fresh plant material and which achieves a grade of 95 points or higher. In the judging of this exhibit "Personal Expression" must be one of the qualities to be scored.

MERIT—May be awarded to the exhibit judged as the finest in the Horticulture Section, providing it achieves a point score of 95 or more.

ARTISTIC DIVISION

CLASS I "Rose Garden" 9 entries

A design using fresh plant material, not to exceed 10 inches in any dimension. To be exhibited in the Powder Room.

† CLASS II "Woodland Garden" 6 entries

A composition including some dried material, to be hung against a walnut panel, 28 inches wide and extending from floor to ceiling.

* CLASS III "Formal Garden" 6 entries

An arrangement depicting a feeling of elegance. Class to be staged on two library tables. Each arrangement of all fresh cut plant material to be allotted three feet square.

* CLASS IV "Country Garden" 5 entries

A design of all fresh plant material, complementing a print to be selected at the Library by the exhibitor. The print will be hung on the wall above the arrangement. Card tables—30 inches square—provided.

* CLASS V "Farmer's Garden" 5 entries

A design incorporating fruits and/or vegetables, all fresh materials, complementing a print to be selected at the Library by the exhibitor. The print will be hung on the wall above the arrangement. Card tables—30 inches square—provided.

† CLASS VI "Oriental Garden" 5 entries

A composition in the Oriental manner, to be staged on low, marble-top tables. Two feet square of table top is allotted for each entry.

† CLASS VII "Garden Party" 6 entries

Each exhibitor will present a place setting and arrangement appropriately planned for dining in the garden. She will choose one of the six primary and secondary hues of the spectrum as her predominant color. Class to be staged on long table, allotting two feet (width) by three feet (depth) for each entry.

CLASS VIII "Monastery Garden" 4 entries

A design incorporating a book as an accessory. To be displayed on individual lamp tables within a space of 13 inches (long), 13 inches (wide), by 15 inches (high.) INVITATION CLASS.

SHOW REGULATIONS

1. Entries will be received for the Artistic Division beginning at 9:00 A.M. on Wednesday, May 25, 1966 by Mrs. Robert W. Off and Mrs. George C. Wilson, III at 362-1029.

2. Each exhibitor in Class VII should obtain a sample of her predominant color from Mrs. William L. Sloan, II, at 621-1225.

3. Exhibits must be in place by 11:00 A.M. on Wednesday, September 28, when the judging will begin, and remain in place until 5:00 P.M. Thursday, September 29. Exhibits must be kept fresh for the duration of the show.

4. Exhibitors must check with the Classification Committee when their exhibits are in place.

5. Exhibitors may have only one entry in any one class or subdivision of a class.

6. Each exhibitor is responsible for her space and must supply a substitute if unable to exhibit.

7. Specimens in the Horticulture Division should be grown by the exhibitor, and each should be labeled if possible.

8. Potted plants must be in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months prior to the show.

9. No conservation material permitted. (Lycopodium-ground pine, Dogwood, Arbutus).

10. Standard system of judging will be used. Tri-Color Award and Creativity Award will be available—and the Award of Merit for Horticulture. Any award may be withheld at the discretion of the judges, whose decisions will be final.

11. All exhibits must be removed by 6:00 P.M. on Thursday.

SPECIFIC RULES FOR THE HUNT BOTANICAL LIBRARY

1. The Library is open on weekdays from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. so that an exhibitor may look at the various areas involved in the show before choosing her class. Please study the floor plan before selecting your position.

2. Selection of prints to be used in Classes IV and V will take place on Tuesday, June 14 and Tuesday, June 21, between 9:00 A.M. and 12:00 Noon at the Hunt Botanical Library.

3. Low-heeled shoes must be worn in the Library at all times.

4. All exhibits must be made in advance and brought to the Library. No arranging is allowed on the premises.

5. No water is available at the Library. Each exhibitor must bring what she needs for her exhibit.
